From the Rabbi's Study



Last fall, Rosh Hashanah was not particularly "early" or "late." You may not even think that the upcoming Passover holiday is particularly "late" this year, beginning on April 22.

But by the time we get to Rosh Hashanah, which falls on October 3rd and 4th, you'll not only think that the holidays are "late", but also may wonder what on earth is going on?

You may have heard someone say that the Jewish Holidays - all of them - are never early or late; they always fall at the right time *on/in the Jewish Calendar*. But that still doesn't stop us from classifying them as falling either "early" or "late."

So, what on earth *is* going on?

To understand and appreciate the answer, a bit of an explanation is required. Our Hebrew Calendar is largely a Lunar Calendar: it is based on the 29 and one -half day cycle of the moon; a 12-month Lunar Year contains 354 days. If we were to follow a strictly Lunar Calendar, as the Muslims do, we would see our holidays "recede" from year to year by 11 and onehalf days, as Ramadan does. (All of us are aware that the Muslim month of fasting, Ramadan, occurs in different seasons, and their strictly lunar calendar explains why). Were we to follow the strictly lunar calendar, the end result would be that Passover, for example, would recede too: at first, it would move from the spring and be celebrated in the winter, and then a few years later, we would find it in the fall, and then in the summer, before returning to the spring. And then that cycle of "receding through the year" would repeat itself again and again.

But the Torah doesn't just mandate that we follow a lunar cycle; it also requires that our holidays be celebrated in specified seasons: Passover is a spring harvest festival and Sukkot celebrates the fall harvest. In order to accomplish this neat trick of following a Lunar Calendar, but at the same time maintaining the seasons (which requires adhering to a 365-day Solar Calendar), our ancestors devised a Lunar-Solar Calendar. The essential feature of this calendar is that just as we insert a *leap day* every four years at the end

of February to compensate for the earth circling the sun in 365 and <u>one-quarter</u> days, we intercalate an entire *Leap Month* once every two to three years (7 times within a 19-year cycle), to keep us on the proper seasonal track (more or less).

So, in some years (if there hasn't been a 13-month leap year for a while), the holidays will fall "early", and right after a 13-month year, the holidays will be pushed back a bit and seem "late".

And the reason that I am writing to you about all of this now, is not only because we are in a Hebrew leap year, but because the month of March straddles the 12th and 13th Hebrew months, Adar I and Adar II. It is the insertion/intercalation of this leap month that will cause/ push next Rosh HaShannah to fall in early October.

I readily admit that I am fascinated by the workings of the Hebrew Calendar and I stand in awe of the ingenuity of our ancestors who devised a system that has withstood the test of time. Even more amazing is that this calendar contains a variety of other features, among them one that assures that Yom Kippur will never fall on a Friday or a Sunday (because that would mean two restrictive days of Shabbat in a row, making it either impossible to break the fast with a sumptuous, hot meal or to enter the fast with a full stomach). The devil may be in the details, but so is the genius! Our calendar is one more thing that causes me to marvel at the beauty and depth of our tradition.

But the calendar itself is only a framework—a mere shell. Far more important is to live by and appreciate the rich rhythms of our calendar, its daily, weekly, and annual observances as we celebrate them both in our homes and as a community in our Synagogue.

In that vein, please join us for our **Purim celebration** on Wednesday evening, March 23rd, and Thursday morning, March 24th. I also urge you to participate in the Sisterhood *Mishlo'ach Manot* project. This wonderful undertaking can help to foster the sense of community and belonging that we are continually striving to create for our shul.

PURIM - HOLIDAY OF JOY AND DELIVERANCE



Our tradition tells us, **"Mishenichnas** Adar Marbim B'Simcha!" When we welcome Adar, we increase happiness, meaning and fulfillment in our lives because of the hope that God holds in store for us, even as God saved our people during the time

when **Ahashverosh** reigned and **Haman** plotted evil for our people.

This month the festive holiday of **Purim** will be marked on **Wednesday evening, March 23rd and Thursday, March 24th**. It is the most festive and comical of all holidays on the Jewish calendar. People get dressed up in costumes and disguises. During the **Megillah** (**Megilat Esther**) reading we make loud and sometimes sustained sounds when we drown out the name of **Haman**.

The music unique to **Purim** consists of a special chant used to read the **Megillah**. One of our favorite songs of **Purim** (and year round as well) is **Utzu Eitza V'tufar**. The words come from the Prophet Isaiah. This is a melody I remember from my youth and is a

song that was even sung by those who went through concentration camps during WWII. It was a song of defiance against the enemy – the Nazis, and pride in what we as Jews represent. Just as in ancient days God destroyed those who planned evil against us, were themselves destroyed by God. For this reason, those who found themselves in concentration camps sang **Utzu Eitza** with faith, fervor and hope.

As we enter the month of **Adar II**, we must remember to lift our spirts to celebrate the joy of life and survival. So may it be for many years to come.

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
